The vigour and variety of life outside the classroom are both a cause and a symptom of a happy and thriving community at Wallingford School. The school is very active after lessons with a number of clubs and teacher-led sessions.

Some subjects, such as Geography and History, require field work studies, and we have run successful trips to Iceland, Morocco and Ypres.

The Languages department has a tradition of visits and trips to France and Germany. There is a four day trip to France offered in Year 8 and Year 7 students spend a summer day in Boulogne or Aachen.

Some trips are just for fun and include days out to theme parks or paintballing, evening trips skating or bowling and residential visits to a number of centres around the country.

The opportunities for performing Music, Dance and Drama are outstanding and have gained the school a strong reputation. Lunchtimes and after school are filled with practices for the Bass Group, the String Group, Choir, Wind Group and Orchestra.

Departments often receive visitors and outside experts. We take advantage of our close proximity to Oxford, Reading and London universities.

Tuesday - After an early start to drive up into the Vercors mountains, we spent the morning at the Mémorial de la Résistance learning about resistance in occupied France. This afternoon we went on a very windy snow walk and despite much less snow than in previous years students still managed to find enough for some snowballs! We ended our day with a chocolat chaud.

Wednesday - In the morning we explored Grenoble and met the Deputy Mayor, who explained a bit about the history of Grenoble and spoke to us about the importance of school exchanges. There is no school on a Wednesday afternoon in France, so students had a free afternoon with their partners!



Thursday - We spent the day in Lyon. We did a walking tour of the old town visiting the Basilica, the Roman amphitheatre and the famous Traboules. After some free time for shopping and lunch, we visited the excellent Cinema Museum. We are looking forward to attending lessons at our partner school today!



Duke of Edinburgh During Lockdown


School Website News Report: July 2020

After receiving our Duke of Edinburgh licence in March, we have launched the Bronze Award with Year 9. The award is a superb opportunity for the students to develop a new skill, improve on something physical, give back to the community through volunteering and complete a two-day expedition. University admissions tutors and employers alike welcome applicants having completed the scheme, as it shows that young people have had to show initiative, creativity and leadership in completing the four different skill areas for their award.

Unfortunately, lockdown, as with everything, somewhat complicated how we had initially planned to proceed with the award. This being said, we are delighted that we have managed to get 41 Year 9s signed up and working towards completing their D of E bronze award. Whereas ordinarily we would have been able to work with students in school in lunchtime or after school sessions, we have had to adapt to using Microsoft Teams to manage our participants and ensure that they are making progress with their award.

COVID restrictions have obviously made it difficult for our participants to find tasks to complete for their award. Sports teams have not been training and playing together, volunteering is obviously a lot more difficult, to name but two examples of how creative our students have had to be. In spite of all of this, we have been blown away by how lucrative our participants have been in coming up with ideas for their physical, skill and volunteering sections, which are both appropriately challenging and allow them to develop.





For example, George Earl in Year 9 for his volunteering section has been rearing five baby ducks at a local care home. Max Collins has raised over £600 for a charity through making music on his Youtube channel. For her skill section, Katie Garwood has successfully learned to make a range of tye die clothing – they look fab! Elsewhere, as lockdown is beginning to ease, we are thrilled that students are able to get back into their former sports teams to start working on their physical element: so far we have rowing, archery, golf, cricket, fitness, running, weight training, cycling, basketball amongst other sports that our participants are doing to complete this section.

We are very proud of our participants for their work thus far. Our plan as a D of E centre in school is not just to run bronze award, but to eventually run Bronze, Silver & Gold. We look forward to 4 years down the line when we hope our current Bronze Year 9 participants will be completing their Gold Award.

Performing Arts

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Wallingford School has a tradition of high quality public performance, be it through the Christmas Production, Spring Concert, Spotlight Dance Show, or appearances at community events. Some young people with particular talent are released each year to take part in professional performances around the region. Expressive Arts subjects are all available from Year 7 through to A Level.

In Music, students develop an understanding of a wide range of musical styles, genres and traditions, as well as compose and improvise with a variety of instruments. Musicians have the opportunity to take part in the Bigg Band, South Oxfordshire Saturday Morning Music Service, the Oxfordshire Senior Schools Orchestra, County Youth Orchestra and County Youth Big Band. A number of our students go on to read music at universities and conservatoires.

In Drama (Theatre Studies at A Level), students concentrate on devising their own pieces and finding ways of bringing scripts to life. They also use visual and written stimuli to generate mini productions of their own to perform to their peers. There are public performances as part of examination work at GCSE and Sixth Form.

In Dance, students develop their performance skills, working as individuals and in groups. As they move up the school, they focus increasingly on their own choreography. The Spotlight Dance Show is an annual opportunity in school for students to celebrate dance in front of an audience, while many choose to combine their studies with membership of local dance groups and productions.


