The atmosphere was full of excitement and nerves from the minibus, to the train, to Pret where we had lunch! We spent the day rehearsing, enjoying the provided snacks, and getting to know our way around the building. The day was extremely productive, but we still had our fair share of laughs. Even though we didn't win, the experience and skills gained will stick with us for the rest of our lives. We have had a very busy time in Music!

In November, 57 GCSE Music students visited the Royal Festival Hall for an interactive concert with the world-famous London Philharmonic Orchestra. They guided us through detailed musical analysis with quizzes, and students sharpened their listening skills. The programme included the third movement of J.S. Bach Brandenburg Concerto No. 3, where students watched a harpsichord being played, the beautiful first movement of Bartók's Hungarian Pictures, and students could perform with the orchestra in the minimalist music by Steve Reich.

We also heard music by Tchaikovsky, Coleridge-Taylor, taking us from the Romantic period to the 20th century, covering themes and terminology relevant to the exam



board. There was some film music by the most iconic film composers of all time, and a multitude of timbre techniques played and explained in Saariaho's Forty Heartbeats (1998).

Tilda, Year 10, said, "It was a fantastic experience to witness a live orchestra!"

Alicia, Year 10, said, "My favourite piece was the Hungarian Dance by Bartók, especially the clarinet solo."

Harry, Alex and Edward, Year 11, said, "It was highly enjoyable and a great educational experience that will definitely help us in our exam."



A few weeks ago, our Year 7s were treated to a concert by the Huw Wiggins Saxophone Quartet! At the end, students took part in a Q&A, where they answered musical questions relating to what they have learnt about orchestral instruments in term 1 and their knowledge of musical elements in term 2.

A big thank you to Huw Wiggin Saxophone Quartet, and to the Wallingford Chamber Music who funded the experience as part of their 40th anniversary celebration.



All our ensemble groups are in full rehearsal mode at the moment, from Clarinet Group, String Ensemble, Brass Ensemble, KS3 Choir and our amazing new Percussion Ensemble, who performed for the first time at our Christmas Concert. We had a wonderful range of performances, including KS3 students playing Christmas music on the piano, Year 10s duetting on vocals, the KS3 Choir debuting their new uniform and singing energetically, and all our fantastic ensembles! At the end of the concert all musicians performed with the audience singing "We Wish you a Merry Christmas!"

The Christmas Concert was a huge success raising £500, which will go towards a xylophone for our new Percussion Ensemble! Thank you for your kind donations!



The KS3 Choir performed four times in the weeks leading to Christmas Holidays: at Sotwell Hill House; the Town Centre with Cholsey Silver Band; alongside the Mayor hosting the Wallingford Christmas Lights; and for Style Acre at St Mary's Church, where they used Makaton sign language.

Members of the Chamber Choir performed with Benson Choral Society at Dorchester Abbey. And what better way to start the Christmas season than with Benson Choral Society's amazing performance of J S Bach's Christmas Oratorio! Bach made this compilation from the series of 6 cantatas written in Leipzig for the Christmas feast-days in 1734/5. It's a powerful account of the Christmas Story. The choir was accompanied by Baroque instruments of the renowned period orchestra 'Instruments of Time and Truth', and a quartet of sparkling soloists.

The final performance will be at the







Christmas end-of-term whole school assembly. The KS3 choir and Bigg Band will be performing 'All I want for Christmas' with Iris Anderson singing the solo part.




UKMT challenges have already started this year for Sixth Form students and there have been some exciting additions to the calendar.

The Mathematical Olympiad for Girls was accompanied by the Mathematical Competition for Girls this year. The aim of these challenges is to close the gender gap in students choosing to study maths at a higher level. The introduction of the Mathematical Competition for Girls allows even more girls to take part. Three students took part in the Olympiad, a challenging 2.5 hour question paper designed to challenge the highest ability students. All 3 students received a certificate of merit. Well done to Orla McNulty, Grace Smyth and Jessie Clayton. 12 students took part in the 90-minute competition. Georgia Masters received a certificate of distinction which is an amazing achievement. Melissa Loyd, Elodie Hall-Palmer, Emily Byron, Yisha Jacobson, Madeleine Cornut and Lucy McCalla all received a certificate of merit. A huge well done to all those who took part.

October saw the Senior maths challenge for sixth form students. 63 students took part, with 28 bronze, 18 silver and 8 gold certificates gained. 8 students qualified for the next round with Douglas Blake, Joshua Skeels, Celyn Marriot, Rohan Clark, Nazar Mykhailenko, Samuel Harpham and Ben Godfrey qualifying for the senior Kangaroo gaining 3 bronze and 2 silver certificates. Charles Mortimer qualified for the British Olympiad – a massive achievement! We still await his results as marking of this tricky challenge takes UKMT's volunteers a long time.

This year also saw the return of the senior team maths challenge for the first time since



Covid. A team of two Year 12 and two Year 13 students travelled to Matthew Arnold School to compete against other schools from around Oxfordshire. They had a great day surrounding themselves with like minded students and teachers from other schools. Well done Charles Mortimer, Matthew Hindle, Jessie Clayton and Harvey Brewer.

Well done to all of the sixth formers who have taken part.

In November, the KS4 Debate team (Joseph, Jasmine, Thomas, Edward and Daisy) took part in the English Speaking Union's MACE competition, the oldest and largest debating competition for schools in England and Wales. We were chosen as the opposition for the topic "This house would ban dating and relationship-based reality TV". This meant we had the tricky task of coming up with reasons why dating shows should not be banned. Together, we spent a few weeks beforehand researching and developing ideas and evidence for our case, eventually coming up with three main points for the argument.

The competition was held at Bradfield College, who were very hospitable hosts, providing us with a range of excellent food, particularly the soup (was three bowls too much?). We were paired against Langtree School, who presented some excellent arguments on the effects of reality shows on contestants' mental wellbeing, and fought against Wallingford with a well-thought-through case. Thank you to them for such brilliant competition.

At the end of the night, the all-important scores came in from the judges, and although there was some confusion over a misspelling of the school, Wallingford was announced as going through to the next round.

Thank you to Mrs Harding for her excellent mentoring so far. The team feels we have learnt a lot from this experience and we're excited to take this new knowledge into the next section of the competition.

My Neighbour Totoro

On Thursday the 13th of November, Year 11 Drama students went on an unforgettable school trip to see the play 'My Neighbour Totoro' at Drury Lane, in central London.



Leaving school during period 2, we arrived in London in time for the 2:00 start, with the play running for two and a half hours (including the interval) meaning that we arrived back at school very late: around 7pm!

The play, based off the Studio Ghibli animated movie of the same name, focuses on two sisters, Mei and Satsuki, who have moved from Tokyo to the Japanese countryside and learn to embrace the supernatural spirits that live in the countryside with them. The spirits involved some outstanding puppetry, with an ensemble of puppeteers moving covertly around the stage and blending in with the background while controlling their characters. Perhaps 14 months (so far) of learning terminology of stage directions, acting techniques and costume design (to mention just a few of the topics in GCSE Drama) allowed me to see the play through a whole different lens of well-thought-out design and planning. In particular, the immersive set with gnarled trees and treehouses around the edges gave the illusion of being in the forest- and the trees even moved further into the stage when the characters were exploring beyond the village, deeper into the forest.

All of the class thoroughly enjoyed the trip. Eliza said: "I thought the puppets and set were really creative. The ensemble work and the band were so good too!" Jasmine thought that "it was a very magical production that brought the characters to life incredibly well". Even Jacob, who admitted that he wouldn't want to see the play again, said: "The puppetry was spectacular and I enjoyed the movement of the set on its turntable."

However, the trip served a greater purpose than simply sitting back and enjoying the show. In the final exam, 25% of the exam consists of questions about the show you watch, so the excursion was, in fact, a crucial part of our GCSEs. Despite this, the trip has definitely been one of my favourite school trips so far, and, given the chance, I would definitely watch the play again and bask in the ingenuity and suspense of the production.

On 15 November a group of 14 students from Year 10 to Year 13 arrived bright and early outside a drizzly Oxford Crown Court to participate in the Young Citizens' Bar Mock Trial competition. Although we enter a team of Year 8 and 9 students in the Magistrates' Mock Trial every year, this was a new venture and a chance for some of those who had experienced mock trials lower down the school to hone their skills further on more serious cases. The team had had less than two months to prepare the prosecution and defence sides for two different cases, one involving someone accused of dealing drugs, and another with the defendant accused of threatening a noisy neighbour with a gun. Our students took on the roles of lawyers, witnesses, defendant, jury, and court staff, competing against teams from across the south east of England. Although we didn't walk away as regional winners, the team did themselves proud, and we received positive comments about how well-prepared and professional they were, as well as a bright future predicted for the acting careers of some of our witnesses! The day ended with a fascinating Q&A session with two practising barristers, who shared tips on getting into the profession and stories of memorable moments from their careers.

Here are some of the students' thoughts on their experience:

Being able to take part in the Bar Mock Trials was an incredibly fun and rewarding experience. Although law isn't particularly one of my interests, taking part in mock trials has been a highlight of my year every time I've done it. I have always loved drama and through playing the roles of lawyer and witness over the years, I've been blessed with the opportunity to enrich my skills in teamwork, persuasive writing, improvisation and public speaking. In



this particular competition I played a defence witness, a part more on the drama side, which as a drama student I found incredibly enjoyable.

The day itself ran smoothly for the most part and was first and foremost a pleasure. The other schools competing were friendly and everyone exhibited great sportsmanship. Although we didn't end up winning, each member of the team worked hard, did excellently and was proud to represent their school. I truly felt I got a lot out of this experience and I'm glad I was able to tackle my anxiety and have an amazing day out with my friends. I look forward to (hopefully) doing it again next year!
